

What is the Jerusalem Project?

The Jerusalem Project is an attempt to contact every household within a mile of the church.

A Practical Way to do the Jerusalem Project

The One-Night Blitz.

- a. Determine approximately how many from your group can come on July 11.
- b. Divide how many are coming into teams consisting of 2 to 5 people.
- c. Take the number of visits that need to be made and divide that by the number of teams you have made.
- d. Make a local map for each team and keep a master copy, too.
- e. Highlight the homes on your **master** local map in different colors according to the number of teams you have. For instance, if you have 4 teams, highlight the homes each team needs to visit in a different color. Highlight the local map **each team will receive** in their color with the homes they should visit.
- f. Make your visits.
- g. Get together afterward to fellowship and talk about the experience.
- h. Don't forget to instruct each team to have a representative report back to the church with a summary of the visits made so they can be posted to the large map.

Example: Let's say 20 people can come and you have 45 visits to make. Divide into 5 teams of 4 people. 45 divided by 5 teams is 9 ... so each team needs to make 9 visits that night. Allow 10 minutes for each visit, so you should be able to get back together somewhere about an hour and a half from the time you start.

Organization:

Number of visits to be made (look at your district):

_____ = **V**

Number of people coming (ask your group):

_____ = **P**

P divided by 2 = **T** (the maximum number of teams you can have...each team must have at least 2 people going together)

V divided by **T** = _____ (the number of visits each team must make)
